ADVANCED MANUFACTURING AND SKILLED CRAFTS CENTER

The new **34,000-SQUARE-FOOT**, two-story facility is the home to many of MTC's programs that prepare students for careers in advanced manufacturing and skilled crafts.

Growing the College | ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- > A new MTC Bridge Program with Coker College was implemented that includes a structured 2+2 curriculum that provides MTC Marketing and Management graduates with admission to Coker College and access to Coker College courses online and at the MTC Beltline Campus one evening a week.
- > Six MTC career programs successfully completed program reviews during the assessment process. The degree programs include Criminal Justice, Architectural Engineering Technology, Civil Engineering Technology, Mechanical Engineering Technology, Respiratory Care, and Computer Technology. Additionally, the American Bar Association House of Delegates granted re-approval to the MTC Paralegal Program through 2022.
- > 32 Career Program Advisory Committees comprised of representatives from more than 500 businesses, industries, and agencies provided recommendations for aligning our programs to community needs, equipment upgrades, and employment opportunities for MTC academic degrees, diplomas, and certificates.

Making Lives Better | ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- MTC inducted 22 new members into the National Technical Honor Society (NTHS), representing the college's Engineering Technologies, Health Sciences, and Nursing programs. NTHS ensures MTC students gain national recognition for outstanding academic achievement.
- Diverse: Issues in Higher Education ranked MTC in the top 100 colleges in the United States (#64) in terms of African-American students earning associate degrees. It is the fifth consecutive year MTC has been designated as a top 100 producer among the approximately 1,200 technical and community colleges in the country.
- > MTC was awarded a \$2.25 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education to help improve the success of high-risk, first-time freshmen through enhanced academic advising and student engagement.

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) affirmed MTC's high educational quality after review of the Fifth-Year Interim Report.

Accreditation has significant bearing on the transferability of credits, eligibility for federal student financial assistance, and employability after graduation.

Superintendents and school board members from all eight school districts in Fairfield, Lexington, and Richland counties attended the second annual MTC K-12 Partnership Summit. K-12 guests, the MTC Commission, and executive staff explored ways to strengthen initiatives and include more students in college programs.

Leveraging Goodwill

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- > The Smithsonian Museum turned to MTC for help designing and creating a tool. The National Museum of American History needed invention kits made for hundreds of students visiting during the National Week of Making in June 2016. MTC students, guided by expert faculty and utilizing advanced facilities, helped the Smithsonian with its national public service project.
- > MTC Automotive Technology program faculty and staff, in conjunction with the MTC Operations Department, worked tirelessly to ensure students could return to classes as scheduled after the automotive shop was flooded in October 2015. Several vehicles were destroyed in the flood. One year later, the Automotive Technology program has received donated replacement vehicles from Nissan North America and the Dick Smith Automotive Group.

ENTERPRISING WOMEN MAGAZINE named MTC alumna Lasenta Lewis-Ellis the 2016 Enterprising Woman of the Year. The award is widely considered one of the most prestigious recognitions for female business owners in the nation. Lewis-Ellis graduated from the Architectural Engineering Technology Program and has funded two student scholarships. She also is a graduate of FastTrac, a program that helps entrepreneurs develop their technology and science-based businesses.

The nursing cap is no longer a part of most female nurses' uniforms, but it is still a well-known symbol of the profession. The cap signifies the industry's timeless values of caring, dedication, dignity, and integrity.

Myles, the Jeep, joined the graduates before their pinning ceremony in May 2016.

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Growing the College | STUDENT SUCCESS

- > MTC welcomed 2,392 first-time freshman and 1,201 first-time transfer students in Fall 2016.
- > High school dual enrollment is up 65.9% from Fall 2015. In Fall 2016, more than 500 students registered to take college classes at MTC that also count toward high school credit. Dual enrollment can save thousands in college tuition costs and shorten the time it takes to earn an associate or bachelor's degree.
- > Gamecock Gateway enrollment grew to 420 students. This is the largest enrollment in the history of the program and is a 170% increase since it began in 2011. The first class of Gamecock Gateway students graduated from USC with their baccalaureate degrees in May 2016.

Making Lives Better | STUDENT SUCCESS

- > The MTC Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) International Honor Society was recognized as one of the top 100 PTK chapters in the nation. The MTC chapter garnered seven regional awards and continued its five-star chapter rating, which is the highest rating available for a PTK chapter.
- In 2015-16, MTC obtained renewal as the only VetSuccess on Campus site in South Carolina. MTC continues to serve one of the largest populations of college veterans and their dependents in the Palmetto State. The college's VA Office has consistently exceeded 90% satisfaction ratings by student veterans and dependents over the past 10 years.

Jayda Manning, a graduate of the Richland One Middle College, became the youngest student to graduate from MTC in May 2016. Manning earned an Associate in Arts degree within months of her high school graduation.

Leveraging Goodwill

STUDENT SUCCESS

- > MTC opened a third College and Career Center at Swansea High School in Lexington School District Four. The centers, located in Swansea High School, Batesburg-Leesville High School, and Fairfield Central High School, increase access to college and enhance student readiness for the higher education experience.
- > MTC received \$1.98 million from the U.S. Department of Education to provide Talent Search services from 2016-2021. This program serves low-income, first-generation students in grades 6-12 to encourage them to persist in school, enroll in postsecondary education, and graduate. 825 students will receive benefits each year.
- > The U.S. Department of Education funded the MTC Educational Opportunity Center (EOC) for \$1.18 million from 2016-2021 as part of a competitive grant. The EOC program assists students and families through the FAFSA process, and it provides adults with assistance in career exploration and college-entry processes. Only three colleges or universities in South Carolina received this funding.





MTC OFFERS NATIONAL INDUSTRY-RECOGNIZED CERTIFICATES AND CERTIFICATIONS

From FRONT-END WEB DEVELOPMENT and Cisco Routing, to high-end business courses that teach project management and business analysis, MTC offers nationally recognized business and information technology (IT) certifications. Our IT graduates have starting salaries between \$30,000 and \$80,000.

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Growing the College | corporate and continuing education

- > MTC is the only South Carolina organization to receive a \$4 million grant through the U.S. Department of Labor's TechHire grant program. It will provide innovative training and information technology talent in the Midlands.
- > MTC hosted 35 QuickJobs information sessions resulting in more than 1,500 attendees and 515 awarded scholarships. QuickJobs programs offer targeted training that leads to in-demand careers and career advancement.
- > Business Solutions increased corporate-sponsored training by 24%, which was the biggest increase in MTC's history.

Making Lives Better | corporate and continuing education

- > 81% of MTC Corporate and Continuing Education graduates in the business, computer, healthcare and human services, and industrial trades and manufacturing programs are employed or continuing their education within six months of graduation.
- > MTC hosted more than 400 people at the Administrative Professionals Conference in April 2016. The annual conference engages attendees to discover new ideas and information to grow their career, while enjoying dynamic speakers and valuable networking.
- > 6,997 employees at 130 employers' sites were trained by MTC faculty, enabling these individuals to gain the skills needed to successfully compete in the local workforce.

- > 16,792 local employees took advantage of one or more training courses to expand their skills and leverage their productivity in the workforce.
- > 72 QuickJobs workforce development scholarships totaling more than \$202,000 were provided by the MTC Foundation along with the support of many individual and corporate partners such as Bank of America, Wells Fargo, International Paper, and Colonial Life.
- > 98% of surveyed Business Solutions customers would recommend MTC graduates as employees.

The employers rated MTC graduates highly on technical skills, overall on-the-job performance, and overall readiness for the workforce.

Growing the College | GIVING MAKES A REAL IMPACT

- > The Midlands Technical College Foundation awarded 51 academic scholarships in the amount of almost \$100,000. Scholarship support is a vital service of the MTC Foundation.
- > The Midlands Technical College Endowment grew by \$1.4 million during FY2015-2016. Pledges to the endowment help provide student support for many years to come.
- > MTC received \$50,000 from Dr. Arthur C. Coogler in honor of his late wife Patricia Mogel Coogler. The Dental Sciences Endowed Scholarship will support students in the dental hygiene and dental assisting programs. The gift was one of the top-five, one-time gifts ever received from an individual in the college's history.

Making Lives Better | GIVING MAKES A REAL IMPACT

- MTC celebrated Black History Month by welcoming graduates of Harbison Institute back to the site of their campus. Originally founded in Abbeville in 1882, Harbison Agricultural College was relocated to the current site of MTC's Harbison Campus in 1911. Harbison Institute closed in 1958, and 20 years later the property was donated to MTC with the understanding that it would be used perpetually for higher education.
- > The MTC Foundation helped provide emergency financial assistance and book replacement for students who were impacted by the floods of October 2015. One of these students was Bianca Alvarez, an MTC nursing student who lost all of her books in the flood.
- > Bridging the Gap Scholarship funds were provided for more than 20 students who needed additional funding sources to be able to attend MTC.

- In March 2016, the MTC Foundation unveiled a presidential hall of honor at Harbison Theatre. The display honors the leadership and dedication of each of the five past MTC presidents: Robert L. Grigsby, Jr.; Dr. James R. Morris, Jr.; Dr. James L. Hudgins; Dr. Barry W. Russell; and Dr. Marshall (Sonny) White, Jr.
- > The Midlands Technical College Foundation and the MTC Corporate and Continuing Education division hosted the inaugural Celebration of Partnerships event in May 2016 honoring those whose support has made the college a first-choice institution. The celebration included alumni, distinguished guests, and more than 100 college partners; including many representatives of the 130 companies that choose MTC as their preferred training partner.
- More than 100 people attended the Annual Scholarship Donor Breakfast in April 2016. The event thanked MTC's generous scholarship donors and provided them the opportunity to meet their scholarship recipients.

- > This season, MTC unveiled the Harbison Theatre Art Gallery, featuring work created by MTC students and by professional visual artists living in our service area.

- In 2015-2016, Harbison Theatre at MTC doubled the size of its Signature Series, offering 22 professional performances, talks, and screen events.
